



Week 11



keep the Sabbath." But others asked, "How can a sinner perform such signs?" So they were divided. Then they turned again to the blind man, "What have you to say about him? It was your eyes he opened." The man replied, "He is a prophet." They still did not believe that he had been blind and had received his sight until they sent for the man's parents. "Is this your son?" they asked. "Is this the one you say was born blind? How is it that now he can see?" "We know he is our son," the parents answered, "and we know he was born blind. But how he can see now, or who opened his eyes, we don't know. Ask him. He is of age; he will speak for himself." His parents said this because they were afraid of the Jewish leaders, who already had decided that anyone who acknowledged that Jesus was the Messiah would be put out of the synagogue. That was why his parents said, "He is of age; ask him."

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

Day 2: <u>John 9:24-27</u>

A second time they summoned the man who had been blind. "Give glory to God by telling the truth," they said. "We know this man is a sinner." He replied, "Whether he is a sinner or not, I don't know. One thing I do know. I was blind but now I see!" Then they asked him, "What did he do to you? How did he open your eyes?" He answered, "I have told you already and you did not listen. Why do you want to hear it again? Do you want to become his disciples too?"


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Day 3: <u>John 9:28-34</u>

Then they hurled insults at him and said, "You are this fellow's disciple! We are disciples of Moses! We know that God spoke to Moses, but as for this fellow, we don't even know where he comes from." The man answered, "Now that is remarkable! You don't know where he comes from, yet he opened my eyes. We know that God does not listen to sinners. He listens to the godly person who does his will. Nobody has ever heard of opening the eyes of a man born blind. If this man were not from God, he could do nothing." To this they replied, "You were steeped in sin at birth; how dare you lecture us!" And they threw him out.

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Day 4: <u>John 9:35-41</u>

Jesus heard that they had thrown him out, and when he found him, he said, "Do you believe in the Son of Man?" "Who is he, sir?" the man asked. "Tell me so that I may believe in him." Jesus said, "You have now seen him; in fact, he is the one speaking with you." Then the man said, "Lord, I believe," and he worshiped him. Jesus said, "For judgment I have come into this world, so that the blind will see and those who see will become blind." Some Pharisees who were with him heard him say this and asked, "What? Are we blind too?" Jesus said, "If you were blind, you would not be guilty of sin; but now that you claim you can see, your guilt remains."


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Day 5: <u>John 10:1-6</u>

"Very truly I tell you Pharisees, anyone who does not enter the sheep pen by the gate, but climbs in by some other way, is a thief and a robber. The one who enters by the gate is the sheepherd of the sheep. The gatekeeper opens the gate for him, and the sheep listen to his voice. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. When he has brought out all his own, he goes on ahead of them, and his sheep follow him because they know his voice. But they will never follow a stranger; in fact, they will run away from him because they do not recognise a stranger's voice." Jesus used this figure of speech, but the Pharisees did not understand what he was telling them.


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Day 6: <u>John 10:7-10</u>

Therefore Jesus said again, "Very truly I tell you, I am the gate for the sheep. All who have come before me are thieves and robbers, but the sheep have not listened to them. I am the gate; whoever enters through me will be saved. They will come in and go out, and find pasture. The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy; I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full."


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Day 7: <u>John 10:11-18</u>

"I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. The hired hand is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep. So when he sees the wolf coming, he abandons the sheep and runs away. Then the wolf attacks the flock and scatters it. The man runs away because he is a hired hand and cares nothing for the sheep. I am the good shepherd; I know my sheep and my sheep know me—just as the Father knows me and I know the Father—and I lay down my life for the sheep. I have other sheep that are not of this sheep pen. I must bring them also. They too will listen to my voice, and there shall be one flock and one shepherd. The reason my Father loves me is that I lay down my life—only to take it up again. No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord. I have authority to lay it down and authority to take it up again. This command I received from my Father."

Creative prayer

Wax resist painting can give you images that have echoes of stained glass.


To do this you need paper, and old candle and some paints.

You might like to look at the guide as to how to do this here.

Maybe spend some time creating an image that has come out of your prayer time using the wax resist technique.

You might then like to add layers in different media, for example acrylic or collage.

John used mixed media, inks, chalks, oil pastels, rollers of flat colour. Just look at this black and white study, where he plays with architectural details and scribbles. Here contrast is the idea he is playing with.

And contrast it with this work where he has enlivened his drawing with pastel blocks of colour, and then added glimpses of the

details of the building



Wax resist

One way you can enrich work is to use a wax crayon or a candle to draw your design. Then, using a water colour or thin acrylic wash, you can paint over your design.

The drawing resists the paint and adds to the lively effect.

Adding text

Often John Piper added texts that were significant to his work.


Another way to enrich work is to take a rubbing over an

This painting shows the same use of a grid to work inside. John uses bold blocks of colour and adds to them scribbles, and dots, and splashes of colour. He has used wax resist on the halo and elsewhere. Everything is fluid, and loosely drawn. The ways colour talks to colour is really important to him. The whole effect is almost abstract, but much thought has gone into the design.



Again John chose a window as another basic background shape.

Then some colours to suggest water and earth and sky.

Then he added fishes, trees and plants, and butterflies.


Collage

There is no need for detail in the window shape.

He has really enjoyed the colours of the three background elements and the free and simple shapes of the creatures.

Let your ideas flow . A background shape, like a building , or part of a building , can be used for your own ideas , as a frame to put your ideas inside.

You could use cut outs and create your mixed coloured effects on other sheets, then use glue to stick them on. John used collage frequently.



Look carefully at this painting. There is newspaper used as a cliff and shapes from other publications added.

Also it is likely that Piper used cut outs of his paintings to enrich this work.



Some John Piper techniques how to layer a picture

Using a grid design such as the structure of a window frame to put his design inside.



John was influenced by medieval stained glass. Here he has copied images from sculpture in cathedrals and from his imagination, but very sketchily. Then he has drawn them over loosely coloured painted grounds, within the grid

This gives a feeling of vitality and movement.

If you were to experiment with colours in acrylic, crayons and water colour

Then you could cut shapes to paste into your grid as background to your

foreground images.

Layers = GRID- SHAPES- FOREGROUND
