

Kezia


- You might like to read Job 42 or listen to it here.

- Kezia was a daughter of Job
 - She was born after the sufferings of Job and lived as part of a blessed and wealthy household
 - She had seven brothers whose names are not recorded.
 - Her sisters were Jemima and Kerenhappuch
 - All three sisters were known for their beauty
 - Her name has been taken as a symbol of female equality as she and her sisters, as well as her brothers, received an inheritance from her father

- Meditate over this word or phrase with God until you come to a point of stillness.
- What do you sense God's invitation to you might be and how do you want to respond?
